# Shawnee County Sheriff's Office is older than the state of Kansas

On Thursday, the public will get a chance to see the massive metal bars of the imposing jail door that first guarded prisoners in Shawnee County just a few years after Kansas became a state.

Unlike the 19<sup>th</sup> century prisoners who walked across the door's threshold and spent a lot of time staring out the bars, visitors attending the open house celebrating the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Shawnee County Sheriff's Office will be able to leave at anytime.

The door, built seven years after Kansas was admitted to the union, weighs between 500 and 600 hundred pounds, is mounted in a frame of 4inch channel iron and now stands on casters, On Friday, the 8-foot-tall door and frame was wheeled into the sheriff's office in preparation for the open house. The Shawnee County Sheriff's Office was responsible for the jail until 1981, when the Shawnee County Corrections Department took over management.

In its 150 years, the sheriff's office has had about 650 deputies and sheriffs. Current Sheriff Dick Barta is the department's 40<sup>th</sup> sheriff.

The open house planned for Thursday marks the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of George Washington Berry's appointment on August 25, 1855, by Kansas Territorial Gov. Andrew Reeder as the first Shawnee County Sheriff. Berry's appointment came in the midst of the Bleeding Kansas violence between abolitionists and pro-slavery forces, and Berry, a successful farmer in Monmouth Township and father of five children, ending up declining the sheriff's post, according to "Shawnee County Sheriff's Office 1855-2005", a soon-to-be-published book by J. D. Mauck, a retired deputy, and Rich Mergen, a sergeant in the detectives division at the sheriff's department.

"My hair is too precious to be hazarded by holding the position," the book quotes Berry as writing in a message to Reeder.

About a month later, John Wesley Horner, a farmer and Methodist minister who sometimes practiced medicine, was appointed to the office, officially becoming the county's second sheriff. He served in the post for 13 months. The 160-page book will be published and available for sale later this year.

The 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Horner's appointment will be marked on September 24 with a banquet for current and retired deputies. The jail door will be displayed at the banquet, too.

Besides the open house, banquet and book about the sheriff's department, 175 specially designed badges with serial numbers, a commemorative coin illustrating the seven designs of shoulder patches for the department, and lapel pins have been issued to mark the sesquicentennial.

The jail door surfaced this spring, when Mergen and Capt. Don Christie were tracking down photographs at the Kansas State Historical Society, 6425 S. W. 6<sup>th</sup>. Mergen was looking at the card catalog index when he saw a notation for a 1978 Topeka Daily Capital story about recovery of the door during demolition of the Norva Hotel on the southwest corner of S. Kansas Avenue and 4<sup>th</sup> street.

"How would you like to look at it?" Christie said a curator asked the researchers.

The courthouse jail was built in 1867- and 1868 – Kansas became a state on January 29, 1861. there were numerous prisoner escapes from the basement-level jail because it north side windows were next to a sidewalk where passers-by could pass contraband into the hands of inmates, Mergen said. The jail moved to another courthouse in 1886, but the door remained at 4<sup>th</sup> and S. Kansas, which was remodeled into first the Reid Hotel, then the Norva Hotel.

When the Norva was demolished by Champney Wrecking Co. in 1977, company owner George W. Champney donated the jail door to the state historical society, the article said.

The door, which is on loan to the sheriff's office, stands 6 feet 7 inches tall, is 3 feet 1 inch wide and is 3.25 inches thick. It will be returned to the state historical society with the iron frame and caster, Christie said.

### **Sheriff Office's History Recalled**

#### Department began in violent days of Bleeding Kansas

On Saturday, the Shawnee County Sheriff's Office celebrated 150 years of service and bravery, with perhaps emphasis on the latter.

It turns out that the first person appointed as sheriff didn't want the job and never served, saying it was too dangerous because of the Bleeding Kansas violence between abolitionists and proslavery adherents slightly more than five years before Kansas was a state.

A banquet Saturday evening at the Ramada Inn Downtown coincided with the second anniversary observe by the sheriff's office in less than a month. In August, the department had an open house. The two dates are tied to the anniversaries of its first two sheriffs.

The first anniversary is linked to Aug. 25, 1855, when George Washington Berry was appointed by Kansas Territorial Gov. Andrew Reeder as the first Shawnee County sheriff. Berry, a successful farmer and father of five children, declined to serve.

On September 24, 1855, John Wesley Horner, a farmer, Methodist minister and sometimes doctor, was appointed. He accepted and served as sheriff for 13 months.

Shawnee County historian Richard Friedstrom talked about the county's early sheriff and the turbulent, violent days in Shawnee County when there were shootings and the burning of homes spurred by clashes between abolitionist and proslavery forces.

"The sheriff had a tough job," Friedstrom said during an interview at the banquet.

Free-staters and pro-slavery forces collided in northeast Kansas, and guns and violence replaced words during the five-plus years before Kansas became a state on Jan. 29, 1861, Friedstrom said.

Friedstrom admired the sheriffs who didn't always agree with the law of the territory but enforced it nevertheless.

Friedstrom noted that Benjamin Castleman, the county's third sheriff from October 1856 to March 1857 who had been a prosperous owner of a general store in Tecumseh, was a pro-slavery backer.

When Topeka abolitionist John Ritchie and his followers ran low on supplies, they raided Castleman's store, helping themselves to whatever they needed, Friedstrom said.

When Castleman became sheriff, the tables turned, and the new sheriff pursued Ritchie, Friedstrom said. Before there was gunfire between the two, Castleman wisely backed away from a confrontation with Ritchie, Friedstrom said.

Twice during Saturday night's banquet, the four Shawnee County deputies who volunteered to enforce the law in hurricane-wracked Mississippi were honored.

Capt. Lance royer asked for a moment of silence for Deputies Kenton Lewis and Kelly Jordan, Sgt. John Ostenson and Cpl. Brett Butell.

Working 12-hour days in heat, large mosquitos and smelly conditions, the four are doing general law enforcement work, including comforting homeowners. One woman found only a foundation where her summer home had stood, Royer said.

"You just have to be humble and do what you can," one of the four deputies told Royer.

Former Sheriff Ed Ritchie, former Undersheriff Dale Collie, and retired deputies, including Gaylon Thompson and Richard Warrington, joined Sheriff Dick Barta and current deputies Saturday in celebrating the department's anniversary.

The sheriff's office also is observing its 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary with "Shawnee County Sheriff's Office 1855-2005," a soon-to-be-published book by J. D. Mauck, a retired deputy, and Rich Mergen, a sergeant in the detectives division. A limited number of books will be printed. For information, call Mergen at 268-2234.



### J. D. MAUCK Deputy 1979-1999

Jake Douglas Mauck was born in Topeka, Kansas in 1938. In 1947, Mauck's family moved to a farm north of Silver Lake, Kansas where Mauck attended a oneroom country grade school through the 8<sup>th</sup> grade. J. D. Mauck graduated from Silver Lake High School in 1956 in a class numbering only 28. In

1978, J. D. Mauck earned an Associate of Arts degree from Washburn University in Alcohol and Drug Abuse.

Mauck's first employment was an apprenticeship at the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railway. After 5 years employment with the railroad, Mauck went to work at the E. I. DuPont de Nemours Cellophane plant at Tecumseh, Kansas as a draftsman in the engineering department. Five years later, Mauck began employment with Seymour Foods, Inc. where he served as Parts Department Manager. In 1973, Mauck began working for the Hydra-Tool Corporation as Production Manager where he worked until the company moved to Mississippi in 1978.

J. D. Mauck's first experience in law enforcement began in 1972 when he joined the Topeka Police Reserve program. At the time, reserve officers, after receiving basic training, served as police officers by occupying a patrol area and answering all calls within that area. While serving as a reserve officer for seven years, Mauck realized that his part-time, volunteer activity was more satisfying than working in industry where every day was pretty much like the day before.

In January 1979, Mauck began his career with the Shawnee County Sheriff's Department and was assigned to work in the jail for the first few months of employment. Mauck later worked in Patrol for five years, Warrants for two years and then was assigned to Criminal Intelligence as a Detective in 1985. In 1995, Mauck was promoted to Sergeant and remained in Criminal Intelligence until he retired in March 1999. Because of his work in investigating local anti-government and militia groups, Mauck was subpoenaed to the Terry Nichols trial in Denver, Colorado in 1997 to testify about the possible involvement of Shawnee County militants in the Oklahoma City bombing.

J. D. Mauck worked with Richard Mergen in gathering data on the history of the Shawnee County Sheriff's Department for the observance of 130 years of department history in 1985. The experience of learning the history of the department developed into an appreciation of the history and of the people who have lived and died serving the Shawnee County Sheriff's Department over the years.

After retirement, J. D. Mauck served four years as a member of the Shawnee County Civil Service Board, serving as Chairman during 2002, his last year of service.



### **RICHARD MERGEN** Deputy 1979-Present

Rich Mergen was born at the Westover Air Force Base Hospital, Holyoke, Massachusetts in 1957, and is the son of Don and Mary Mergen. Rich is the second child of three with an older brother, Doug, and younger sister, Carol.

Rich grew up in Salina, Kansas after his father was stationed at Schilling Air Force Base. Rich

attended Sacred Heart grade school, junior high, and high school, graduating in 1975. While in high school, Rich was a proud member of the undefeated 2A State football and basketball championship teams his senior year. Rich continued his education at Washburn University of Topeka. He joined the Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity his freshman year, and served as President of the Kansas Delta Chapter in 1978. He was promoted to Corporal in January 1984, and served in that capacity until December 1985.

Rich remained in the Criminal Investigation Division as a general case work detective until July 2002, when he accepted a position as the Criminal Intelligence & Crime Analysis detective. Mergen was promoted to Sergeant in March 2004 and serves as the first shift supervisor of the Criminal Investigation Division.

Rich became interested in the history of the Sheriff's Office in 1985 spending nearly two months reviewing old newspaper articles.
